Māori Enjoying Success as Māori; Māori Learners achieving academic success while enhancing their identity, language & culture



St Benedict's School is committed to creating a school culture that recognises and values the unique position of Māori in Aotearoa society. We strive to create deliberate acts of teaching around the understanding of te Tiriti of Waitangi, te Reo Māori and te ao Māori for our tamariki.

The skills, strategies and partnerships we will use to help support this plan for our Māori learners are:

- Appoint an internal Te Reo Māori Curriculum Coordinator; plan programmes and instruction in Tikanga Māori
- Utilise our external specialist teachers to support our staff in the teaching of Te Reo Māori, and to improve our students' learning
- Continue integration of Manaakitanga as we strive to empower students with our school's EPIC values (Ngakau aroha Empathy; Manawanui Perserverance; Ngakau pono Integrity; Auahatanga Creativity)
- Offer praise in Te reo Māori, including assembly certificates that promote and use Māori
- Integrate Māori through curriculum areas where appropriate, using resources in the curriculum (especially inquiry, RE, reading, maths, science, social studies, art, music, dance and PE) that recognise New Zealand's bicultural heritage including celebrating te Tiriti o Waitangi, Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori, Waitangi Day and Matariki
- Host Māori Community consultations (hui) and build relationships with whānau, parents and the wider community including the Archdiocese of Wellington Māori pastoral Vicariate
- Offer whole school Kapa Haka, with opportunities to learn and show leadership through karanga, whaikorero, and poi in a performance group
- Inclusion of a whole school powhiri to welcome guests and new families; plan authentic educational visits to Marae and cultural centres
- Through whānau consultation and staff and student feedback, we aim to plan, action and embed a St Benedict's School Haka, Karakia and Waiata
- Sing waiata in assembly, school masses and classroom and music lessons times
- Students learn their own mihi/pepeha; students learning karakia in Māori
- Identify and monitor our Māori students' learning; ensure bilingual signage and displays around our school
- Regular communication to our parents & whānau through email, eTAP, parent learning conversations, newsletters, school blog, website
